


Report from the Treasurer




Turtle Rock YTD Expenses



For the period ending December 2018, total receipts were \$102,889 (budget \$103,318), and year-to-date receipts were \$1,242,691 (budget \$1,239,814). Total expenses for the period were \$96,088 (budget \$103,318), which included \$12,050 contribution to reserves. Expenses year-to-date were \$1,146,513 (budget \$1,239,814), which included \$144,594 contribution to reserves. Total assessments collected to date were \$941,620, and total assessments outstanding are \$12,297.

She has devoted much time and energy to this committee which serves all residents of our community. Her willingness to work with individual homeowners on particular issues has been exemplary.

We will follow her example in providing consultative and helpful assistance to homeowners. I am pleased that two former members of the ARC – Dierdre Cronin and Peggy Cox – will remain on the Committee, and I am delighted to introduce two new members – Carolyn Gossman, Margaret Borrows, and returning member, Jim Vaughan.

Besides the Board of Governors, the ARC is the only permanent committee as directed by the Turtle Rock Protective Covenants. 




FST Improv brings Love and Laughter to the TR Academy



Burial Site Manasota Key

April 11th The Manasota Key Offshore Site

The discovery of a unique 7000 year old archaeological site located off Manasota Key has excited archaeologists, historians of Indian culture and residents of Southwest Florida in the past year.

Landscape Committee

The Landscaping and Grounds Committee held an interim meeting on February 13th to discuss long term planning ideas. Present at the meeting were co-chairs Curt Gilroy and Joan Howe, along with Kathy Wells, Kathrin Harris, new members Diane Geramanis and Jan Merchant, and board liaison Jodi Cunnison.

Curt Gilroy had compiled a list of topics to consider and the committee went through each of the topics, which included:

- What can be done about the health of our ponds? There is concern about encroaching vegetation and bank erosion. Jan Merchant made the suggestion that Dr. Abbey Tyrna, the Sarasota County Water Resources Extension Agent, speak to our committee about possible solutions. The committee will be reaching out to Dr. Tyrna to schedule a meeting.
- What can be done about the aesthetics of our preserves? There are strict county guidelines regarding the treatment of preserves, requiring removal of invasive vegetation by certified professionals, not removing native plants, and no planting of non-native species. One such area is the small "island" within the Blvd just north of Park Shore Lane. The association is not allowed to "manicure" this area, and we must assure that vegetative matter is neither added to nor removed. The committee will also look into the status of clearing the nature trail and posting signs along the trail.
- Now that the bridge has been installed, the additional landscaping around the Community
 Center open area can get underway. The possibility of installing a few benches around the
 Community Center was discussed. The planting of additional trees along Turtle Rock Blvd is
 also a goal.
- ◆ The butterfly garden is in desperate need of renovation. If there is anyone in our Turtle Rock community who would like to help with this project, please contact one of the committee members! Also, we are looking for any Master Gardeners who would like to get involved!
- Some members of our Turtle Rock community have inquired about the possibility of installing a dog park within Turtle Rock. The committee has considered potential sites, although all have various drawbacks. Insurance and other issues must also be addressed, so this topic is to be further explored.
- Should the association decorate Turtle Rock more extensively during the various seasons?
- ◆ The interior of our community center is in need of a good cleaning and fresh paint. This also applies to the interior of the community pool restrooms and the guard houses. Quotes to have this work done are being compiled.

Did you know that Turtle Rock


Boulevard, the main artery through our neighborhood, is 1.5 miles long? Between the north gate and the south gate, there are 4 all-way stop signs, bicycle lanes on both sides of the road, and 14 designated crosswalks. Five school buses from five schools make a total of ten stops every weekday along this busy road.

The posted speed limit on Turtle Rock Boulevard is 25 miles per hour. If you follow the 25 mph speed limit and come to a complete stop at all 4 stop signs, it takes only 4 minutes to travel the full length of Turtle Rock Boulevard from the north gate to the south gate.


If you travel at 45 miles per hour and run every stop sign, it still takes 2 minutes to travel from the north gate to the south gate. Is it worth saving those 2 minutes by driving dangerously through your neighborhood and potentially endangering the lives of your neighbors riding their bicycles in the bicycle lanes, your neighbors attempting to use a designated crosswalk, or your neighbors' children waiting for the bus or walking home from school?

It's your neighborhood!




