

## **Manager's Message**

August brings the afternoon shower pattern. This is the time of year to make sure that your rain sensors on your irrigation system are working properly. Standing water around homes in the community, makes lawn mowing difficult and promotes mosquitos and other unwanted pests. This time of year rain usually provides enough water for the lawn and planting beds.

#### Irrigation, Reclaimed Water, and Fertilization:

An automatic underground irrigation system is required at each property, and all homeowners must use the Sarasota County Reused Water System for irrigation water. Homeowners may not use retention ponds or lakes for residential irrigation. Please follow the current watering schedule as announced by management. Homeowners must ensure their rain sensors are correctly functioning.

Turtle Rock Mailbox Specifications (except for the Savannah Community)

**Posts and required paint color**: A consistent and specific mailbox wooden post, with a functional lower shelf design is required for all areas of Turtle Rock. The top of the post must be 4' 8" inches from ground level. Any protective devices affixed to the bottom of the post must be painted to match the post. No unpainted metal or vinyl will be accepted. Posts should be free of cracks, chips or peeling. Management maintains a current list of mailbox post vendors from whom you can purchase the post and installation. The approved paint color is available from Management. Please see the mailbox post specifications in the Appendix on page xv.

**Mailbox with a functioning flag**: The approved mailbox is white, rounded and either plastic or metal. Both the mailbox and the flag are available for purchase at the Community Center. When installed, the front of the mailbox must not overhang the curb.

**Mailbox Numbers:** Each home must display the approved numbers on both sides of the arm of the post. Screw heads attaching the numbers to the post arms should be painted black. Numbers must be clearly visible. The approved numbers are available at the Community Center for purchase.

**Landscaping:** Vegetation surrounding a mailbox must not overhang the sidewalk or curb, and must be no higher than the mailbox arm on the curbside of the mailbox. Artificial flowers are not permitted.

## **Landscape Committee Report**



The Landscaping and Grounds Committee met on June 26<sup>th</sup> and reviewed ongoing projects. Deep cleaning of the community pool and community center has been done, the grout has been cleaned, the exterior of the public buildings has been power washed and the sliding doors of both north and south guard houses have been repaired. Also, all interior flood light and rims in the pool area are being replaced with LED retrofit bulbs.

On July 2<sup>nd</sup> at the Board of Governors meeting, the Committee presented three quotes to have the following areas painted: the community center, interior of the community pool area, interior of both guard houses, pool entry gates and fence and pergolas. The Board approved the quote recommended by the Committee and the painting will be done this summer. Also, on July 2<sup>nd</sup> the Board also approved a quote provided by the Committee to have new frosted window panes installed in the pool bathrooms and pool house, along with new mirrors in the pool bathrooms and south guard house.




## Turtle Rock Library


Go Set A Watchman 'Watchman' is NOT a sequel to 'To Kill a Mocking-bird'; it is an early draft of the classic novel. The events in 'Watchman' post-date those in 'Mockingbird' but, as stated, that was simply the period in Lee's original version. It is important to understand that this newly-released book is a preliminary version of the classic, not a subsequent or totally different novel.






<u>Me Before You</u> This is a most unconventional love story. Lou and her charge, the handsome, privileged Will Traynor, are at first like oil and water. Will is cold and aloof with everyone, and he seems generally displeased to have Lou around. Lou comes to realize that's because she isn't just a caregiver—she's a babysitter.

<u>Mudbound</u> by Hillary Jordan, reveals how everyone becomes a player in a tragedy on the grandest scale, even as they strive for love and honor. Jordan's indelible portrayal of two families caught up in the blind hatred of a small Southern town earned the prestigious Bellwether Prize for Fiction.






### One Thousand White Women, The Journals of May Dodd


### Turtle Rock Library, continued...

It was a time of innocence and hope for a country with a new, young president. But for thirteen-year -old Frank Drum it was a summer in which death assumed many forms.


A Reliable Wife, is a tense psycho-sexual drama that focuses on the deep passions that lurk inside seemingly average people. Set at the turn of the twentieth century, the novel explores an arranged marriage where no one is who they seem to be and where murder, betrayal, violence, and revenge lurk at the bottom of every character's motivations.





**State of Wonder** by Ann Patchett is an imaginative tale of mystery, morals, ethics, and the delicate balance that can exist within the world, both within a single ecosystem and within ourselves. **Marina Singh**, a doctor, is sent into the Amazon jungle to investigate the death of her coworker. What she finds is a puzzle in ethics, morality and humanity that forces her to rethink her own positions in life and asks the same of the reader.

The Storied Life of A.J. Fikry by Gabrielle Zevin A. J. Fikry's life is not at all what he expected it to be. His wife has died; his bookstore is experiencing the worst sales in its history. As surprising as it is moving, The Storied Life of A. J. Fikry is an unforgettable tale of transformation and second chances, an irresistible affirmation of why we read, and why we love.





The Tea Girl of Hummingbird Lane follows the life of Liyan, growing up picking tea leaves each season with her family and living without electricity or running water in a hut made on bamboo stilts. Li-yan's life is a far cry from the modern world of the late 1980's. Set to follow in her mother's path as a midwife, Li-yan struggles to accept her path and works hard in school hoping to be the first in her village to qualify for upper level schooling that would open up other possibilities. Fate however intervenes through two different men destined to change her life, one through love, the other through the business of tea.

## FREE OPEN HOUSE SESSIONS TO LEARN ABOUT FLORIDA MASTER GARDENER PROGRAM

Each January, the County offers a training program for new Florida Master Gardener volunteers. The application process for the 2020 MG program opens this September 2019.

### **Turtle Rock Retention Pond Task Force**

The task force committee includes Melody Barackman, Chairperson, Deirdre Cronin, , Kathrin Harris, Michelle Vanschouwen, Becky Cox and Jerry Hahn. In August we will be adding Doug Smith.

The task force started meeting in May. We meet once a month but due to summer schedules we have not been able to set a fixed date and time for the meetings. We are tasked with evaluating the condition of our retention ponds, including water quality, chemicals, fertilizer, erosion, invasive plants and invasive fish. We are also looking at our current pond and wetlands maintenance programs. Once we are finished we will issue our report with recommendations for making improvements including our ongoing maintenance programs.

As part of our work we will visit surrounding communities who have already completed similar programs or are in the process of doing so. We will also meet with local and state experts for ideas to help achieve our goals.

One of our tasks will be to educate the Turtle Rock community about why we have retention ponds and their importance in preventing flooding and filtering runoff before it reaches creeks, rivers and the gulf. Healthy well functioning retention ponds can help reduce problems like red tide.

We hope to present our recommendations to the board after the first of the year. If we get approval from the board and the residents ,Turtle Rock should have healthy ponds for many years to come and avoid some of pitfalls and expenses others have encountered.

## Trip Tips, if you travel to to...

### **VENICE**

<u>Food:</u> If you like liver and onions, this is the place to get them! Liver and onions are a Venetian specialty, along with seafood. Pasta is okay, but not as good as in other parts of Italy, especially the south.

<u>Hotels:</u> The Metropole is centrally located on the Grand Canal and is pleasant and mid-priced. I stayed at the Bauer most recently—more upscale and lovely, close to St. Mark's Plaza. Great concierge.

**Day trip**: Hire a car and driver, rent a car, or take trains; I loved visiting Treviso, original production area of Prosecco sparkling and also thought to be the origin of the popular dessert tiramisu. Check out the Roman walls, c. 14<sup>th</sup> century. I also loved Asolo, "The City of a Hundred Horizons," which is known for its Dolomite Mountain views; h

Have a fantastic lunch here: we had the best pizza of our lives, with great dough, fresh tomatoes, fresh basil. Both have lots of shops, great food and drink, and fabulous scenery.

Before you go to Venice, or even if you never go but are interested in Venice, read Donna Leon's **Inspector Brunetti** books.

### **NORWAY**



Instead of one of the large commercial cruises, consider **Hurtigruten**, Norway's ship with a "Midnight Sun" cruise. I took a 12 day cruise on the MS Polarlys, departing from Bergen. Bergen is a lovely town with some Unesco World Heritage sites. The ship goes into far more

fjords than the other cruise ships—partly because it's also a mail delivery ship for the towns and villages along the coast. It also goes farther north, into the Arctic Circle, than other ships. It's a small, comfortable ship, and the passengers are from all over the world; on my cruise, we had one dinner table of 6 Americans, everyone else was from another country—Norway (of course), Austria, Sweden, France, Australia, Great Britain, Germany, to name a few. We had a reserved table for dinner only, and for breakfast and lunch I would sit with others, who liked to practice their English with me. One woman and I did not share a word of language between us, but we connected—smiles each day on the ship and big hugs when we departed. Lovely people. And the sites! So beautiful. The ship has a very large viewing room, right up front, where we would all gather each morning. Our daily program posted information about what we would be seeing, historical notes, food notes—anything helpful and interesting to know about where we were headed that day. Excursions are offered, and you can also disembark and just roam around the town on foot. All the food—which is delicious—is from the local ports. I loved this cruise!
