

September is here, and school is back in session. Please keep that in mind when you are driving throughout the community, especially around the community center and bus stops in Turtle Rock.



The new street signs are up and look great! Thank you to everyone who has called, e-mailed or stopped by the community center to let me know how beautiful they are. By now everyone has seen the new stop signs at Turtle Rock Blvd. and the north end of Sabal Lake Circle. Please be mindful of them and stop completely at all stop signs.

It is also the rainy season which means that the grass is growing rapidly, making the amount of grass clippings increase. Please instruct your lawn maintenance people not to blow the clippings into the ponds or the storm drains that lead into the ponds. Not only does it wash up to the edge of the ponds in huge clumps, rots and smells awful, it also feeds the ponds with excess nutrients which promote algae growth. Remember, the ponds are the filtration system for the storm water runoff. Let's not make their job more difficult.

In last month's newsletter I wrote about mailboxes and the need to clean or replace them. Please take a look at your mailbox flag. If it is faded, (not red) please stop by the community center and pick one up for a dollar.

The rainy season is clearly upon us and we have all experienced its effects to varying degrees. We certainly needed the rain as our drought this spring and early summer took its toll on lawns, trees, and lakes. However, the rains, of late, have been too much of a good thing. Rain cancellations of outside activities are minor compared to the effect the rain can have on our roofs. The ARC has received an inordinate number of requests for roof replacements over the last several months due in part to our aging homes, and exacerbated by the recent heavy rains. Leaking roofs seem to be on the rise, and the Sammon/Gilroy residence has been no exception!

There is a regular monthly cycle for all ARC requests. Whenever possible, however, the ARC will entertain and expedite requests for emergency roof replacements.

Now is a good time to direct your attention to the Turtle Rock Owners' Manual (TROM) available on line at <u>www.myturtlerock.com</u>. The TROM outlines the regulations we each have agreed to by being homeowners in the Turtle Rock community. The landscape section outlines that almost any change made to the exterior of your home, such as painting, driveway replacement, changes to windows, significant changes to existing landscape beds, and tree removal must be applied for in advance and approved by the ARC before any work is started. Even dead trees must have ARC approval before they are removed. Work done outside the TROM requirements and limitations can be subject to fines and costly adjustments to non-approved changes, something all homeowners will wish to avoid.

The purpose of these TROM rules and regulations is to ensure that our Turtle Rock community remains a most desirable and beautiful place to live for everyone. And again, if you have any questions, do not hesitate to call me or any other members of the ARC. We are happy to assist.

Landscape Committee Report



The Landscaping and Grounds Committee met on July 24th and reviewed ongoing progress with Shane Battle from Bloomings.

Bloomings is getting caught up on the community area trimming, including the clubhouse entries, the boulevard outside walls, the Fakahatchee and the Palmettos at the clubhouse. Lake beds are being trimmed. The Awabuki hedge along Central Sarasota Boulevard will also be attended to.

Weed control is ongoing. The damaged turf caused by the earlier drought has largely recovered. As a final note, the tree branches along Turtle Rock Boulevard that have been pushed lower due to the heavy rain, will be trimmed back.



The butterfly garden was also discussed. Clearing of the site where the garden is located will begin in October, followed by the installation of various plantings. This will be a lovely improvement to what is already there. The butterfly garden has not been maintained over the last few years and the future improvements will add greatly to the garden.

The painting of the interior of the community center, guard houses and community pool house have been completed. The spotlights in the pool house have been installed and the sliding glass doors of the guard houses have been repaired.

Turtle Rock Women's Club



JR's Old Packing House Café 987 S. Packinghouse Rd., Sarasota (941-371-9358)

Located in a former packinghouse in the celery district, this funky place is often described as "old Florida" or a "quintessential dive." Take your pick. But do visit, and take your out-of-town friends to enjoy Cuban and American specialties like basa (a grouper cousin), Cuban sandwiches, and more. It's just a hop from the Celery Fields



Audubon Nature Center, so make it a twofer—visit the Celery Fields in the morning to see birds, and have lunch at the Packinghouse. Music most evenings.

Linger Lodge 7205 85th St Ct E, Bradenton (941-755-2757)

People call this place on the Braden River "colorful." Colorful is just the beginning. Al



Roker called it one of the "weirdest restaurants in America." The random taxidermy hanging from ceilings and walls and the road kill menu make it a fun place to go with buddies who aren't afraid of a menu containing gator and frog legs. It's weird, true, but the food is good, and the riverside setting is peaceful.

Lake Louise and Banff

It's been a number of years since I've been there, but some things just don't change—like the breathtaking beauty of Lake Louise and Banff in the Canadian Rockies. I've been twice and want to go back. Both times, I flew into Calgary, stayed overnight there and rented a car for the drive to Lake Louise.

I love **The Post Hotel**, a lodge-like, picturesque hotel near Lake Louise. On my first trip, with 2 women friends, we also spent one night at the luxurious **Fairmont**



Chateau Lake Louise—right on Lake Louise. It's pricey, beautiful, and has a great afternoon tea, but, frankly, I prefer The Post.

Lake Louise is even more beautiful than all the photos you see, and it has plenty for you to do while there. I was going to hike to the Lake Agnes Tea House, but grizzlies were out that day and when I saw a steaming huge pile of poop in the middle of the trail, I headed back to the lake shore. The second time I visited, with my husband, hiking was not on the agenda!

While Lake Louise is amazing, my favorite is **Lake Moraine**. And not to be missed—**Icefield Parkway** with a visit to the **Victoria Glacier**—and, of course, **Banff**, a picturesque town with plenty of restaurants and shops. If you or your family are hikers, you might also get on the **Tunnel Mountain Trail**, when you're in Banff. It's a moderately easy hike, about 2 hours roundtrip.

Both times I visited this gorgeous area, I also stayed in the **Rimrock Resort Hotel**, a lovely hotel nestled in the mountains (so on the first trip, I stayed at The Post, The Chateau, and Rimrock; trip 2, The Post and Rimrock). Rimrock Resort Hotel is close to the **Sulphur Mountain gondola** with stunning views and a somewhat challenging hiking trail (typically 2 hour hikes up with innumerable switchbacks). I saw a number of young kids on the trail, including a 10 year old girl who ended up climbing with me. I took the gondola down, but of course it goes both ways—no need to hike. The time I hiked up, I was catching my breath on the rocks at the summit when a mountain goat came up to me and licked my arms! On my second visit, we took the gondola both ways; my mountain hiking days had passed!

Best time to go: unless you're into winter sports, I'd suggest June, when the crowds will be a little less. Weather can be iffy in September.
