

Single-stream recycling is coming to Sarasota County!

Collection of recyclable materials will transition from a manual dualstream, bin-based collection system to an automated, single-stream, cart-based system.

- One cart will replace the red and blue bins curbside.
- Multi-family or common-area residences will have access to single stream recycling carts.
- Twenty-seven new compressed natural gas-powered recycling collection vehicles are being purchased by Waste Management to service the recycling carts.
- Trucks will use a robotic arm to lift and empty the recycling carts. There will be no changes to curbside collection services for trash or yard waste.

Architectural Review Committee (ARC)

October brings back our snowbird friends, the hint of cooler weather to come, and a large decline in our rainfall. The northern part of our state is actually experiencing a "flash drought" that is causing problems for farmers. Here in Turtle Rock, many lawns and landscape beds are showing the signs of the reduced rainfall. This is a good time to check with your lawn service on their watering recommendations and to touch base with your sprinkler service to make sure your system is operating effectively and at capacity. The Turtle Rock Owners' Manual (TROM) mentions the cycle and days that residents are allowed to water. Residents are still reporting low irrigation water pressure, and you might experience this as well.

The ARC continues to review applications, grant final approvals of work completed, and meet to approve or make recommendations to homeowners for exterior changes to their homes. When making an application, please make sure it is complete with all required samples, contractor licenses, and related information so that the ARC can go about its business efficiently. This also assists our Manager, Ed Olson, as he sends the completed packages to the ARC. Incomplete applications can result in delays in starting your projects.

For the month of September, the ARC saw an increased number of new applications for exterior home improvements – 24 new applications, some with multiple projects. The ARC also visited 31 residences for final approval. With respect to the latter, the ARC urges homeowners whose projects are completed to fill out the form for signing off their completed projects.

Again, ARC members stand by to assist homeowners as they contemplate new projects to renovate, repair, and beautify their homes and properties in Turtle Rock.

Large Group Attends TR Academy Presentation on Cannabis

Dr. Daniel Stein gave a detailed talk and answered many questions about cannabis for a large group of Turtle Rock residents who attended the October Academy lecture.

Cannabis is a very old plant. It was already being used over 5,000 years ago for paper, oil and medicine. Eli Lilly sold cannabis products from 1910, but in 1937 there



began a prohibition on cannabis for social and political reasons. For 80 years the Federal government has classified cannabis as a Class 1 substance which prevents research on the plant in the U.S.

The THC in cannabis makes a person high. The CBD does not. However, where money can be made, there has always been black market business which doesn't provide safe, unadulterated products.

Educating the public about cannabis, its current uses and potential, is what Dr. Stein thinks is important to returning cannabis to use not only to relieve anxiety, tremors, insomnia and treat chronic pain, but also to create wellness without impairment.

In order to use cannabis in Florida, one must register with the state and get a card. This usually costs about \$125 and takes two weeks. You must have a qualifying condition such as PTSD or anxiety or chronic pain. Dr. Stein reviews your complete medical history and then provides guidance for the appropriate means and strength of medication. Inhaled product is short acting, while topicals and edibles and capsules are longer lasting.



All sales of cannabis products and therapy must be in cash as banks and credit card companies are required to follow Federal rules. Medicare does not cover cannabis therapies. If you would like to know more, check out www.neurologyofcannabis.com.

Landscape Committee Report



The Committee met on September 25th and discussed several items with Shane from Bloomings. One issue was the lack of water pressure that homeowners have been experiencing when watering their lawns. Shane explained that much of the problem was due to the drought that we are experiencing, along with the inadequate pump at the main Palmer Ranch station.

The good news received from the Palmer Ranch Master Association is that a new water main is being installed along Palmer Ranch Parkway, between McIntosh Road and the north entrance to Turtle Rock. The pipeline will provide increased pressure and flow in the reuse system for irrigation Please see page 14.

Shane also confirmed during the meeting that the hedges along Turtle Rock Blvd will be trimmed and that extra bougainvillea has been planted at the western side of the south gate. Also, Bloomings will increase weed control in October.

Final quotes were provided to renovate the butterfly garden but the ongoing expenses to maintain the garden are still to be obtained.

Stantec is to begin clearing the nature trail that runs along the west side of our community in October and new signage for the nature trail will be ordered once pricing is established.

The community pool area still needs some painting. The new faucets and new water tank for the pool shower are still to be installed. Quotes are being obtained to replace or repair the pool furniture.

The Committee will be reviewing two sets of quotes at the next Landscape Committee meeting. One set of quotes is for the resurfacing of the community tennis courts and the other set of quotes is for the installation of a sidewalk along Central Sarasota Parkway, just outside of the south gate. Once the Committee has had a chance to review the various quotes, a recommendation will be made by the Committee to the Board of Governors at the November meeting.

Mailbox Task Force



The beautification of our community continues! A task force has been formed to look into the replacement of all the mailboxes in Turtle Rock. After the great improvement that the new street signs provided, it seemed that an upgrade of the mailboxes was in order. The current posts and boxes require a lot of maintenance by homeowners and are frequently in violation. Observe them as you drive around your neighborhood.

The task force includes residents from all areas of Turtle Rock: David Bryan, Jodi Cunnison, Curt Gilroy, Kathrin Harris, Kathy Wells, Patty Fleming representing Savannah, and Harry Hopes and Roberta Maloney from Somerset.

We are looking at examples of boxes and posts from several manufacturers, including Forsite, who supplied our beautiful street signs. Their posts, colors and lettering would match the street signs. We are requesting bids from them and at least one other supplier. A prototype is installed at the community center, (see photo below). We hope to present our findings to the Board soon so that a vote can take place and a decision made at a future Board meeting. We will keep you "posted".

We chose the Holland America line, embarking from Boston harbor in mid-September. It was a mid-sized ship, very comfortable, excellent service.


Tips:

Booking agent: We booked our cruise through AAA. They gave us a \$50 per person beverage coupon and coupons for dinner in two of the onboard restaurants that charge a supplemental fee. (All meals in the Lido buffet lounge or the Main Dining Room are included in the cruise fee.)

Timing: We recommend going on this cruise, or any cruise heading farther north, in the first two weeks of September, instead of in mid-September when we went. It was cold in Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island!

What we loved: The food! We most often ate in the Main Dining Room (we chose Open Seating, so we could go whenever we wanted); we also enjoyed our dinners in the two restaurants.

Onboard activities: Cooking demos by America's Test Kitchen—like being on the set of Food Network TV! Shows every night—a great mix of excellent entertainment. The Spa and the Fitness Center.



Excursions: Our #1 favorite excursion was in Quebec, where we did a 3 hour walking tour. We also loved our time in Bar Harbor—we highly recommend seeing Acadia National Park, stunningly beautiful; our fabulous excursion included a delicious lobster meal. The other ports were all interesting: Charlottetown (Anne of Green Gables land) and Halifax (charming). Our tour of the small community of Sydney was the only disappointing excursion (it was also terribly cold here); we later heard rave reports from those who had chosen the full-day excursion to Peggy's Cove. We disembarked in Montreal, extended our stay by 2 nights, and took the Greyline "hop on and off bus" city tour, which gave us a great overview of the city. Iceland Cean Cerny

To celebrate the 50th birthday of a friend, thirteen of us (five adults and eight young adults, including my daughter Caitlyn) went on an adventure tour arranged by Extreme Iceland. We had our own bus and our own tour guides.

Our six-day trip included:

Tours in the Inner Circle and the western side of Iceland, with one day in Reykjavik

Snorkeling in the Continental Divide (water was 2 degrees C/36 degrees F)

White water rafting, climbing a ice wall, a glacier hike

Hiking into a hole-in-the-ground cave, over rocks and boulders that had dropped into the hole

A relaxing spa day at a beautiful blue lagoon

We saw awe-inspiring waterfalls, fields of gloriously-colored flowers, lava-covered hills, whitewater rivers and streams, glaciers...Our guides supplemented our clothing with outer layers for hiking and rafting, and with crampons (metal plates with spikes fixed to boots), ice picks, and ropes for ice climbing. We spent two nights in "volcano huts," A-framed structures with bunkbeds and outdoor showers. We boarded a Super Jeep, which drove us through a rushing river and over rocks.

Tips:

June was a great time to visit Iceland (unless you want to see the Northern Lights). There was daylight all day long; the temperature was in the 40s and 50s.

A private tour company allows you to see and do what most interests you. You can tailor the tour to what you want, and the tour company takes care of housing, transportation, extra clothing, and supplies.

This was truly an adventure, and a trip that each of us will always remember. The glaciers are shrinking quickly; we saw pictures of how they looked twenty years ago—and realized they will likely be gone in another twenty years. We met young people from Sweden, Norway, Australia, France, Spain, and other countries, who come to Iceland to work. Everyone is friendly and helpful. Reykjavik is charming. No wonder Iceland is on so many "want-to-visit" lists. Even if you don't want to put on spiked boots, grab a rope and climb an ice mountain, there is plenty to see and do: trails to hike, lovely towns to visit, amazing waterfalls, lava fields, roaring rivers and holes in the ground to explore and marvel over.

PROJECT SCHEDULE


Design Start - July 2019, Design Finish - September 2019

Construction Start - October 2019, Construction Completion - January 2020

Project Description

This project consists of the design, permitting, and construction of approximately 1,600LF of 16-inch reclaimed water main along the right-of-way on Palmer Ranch Parkway extension, between McIntosh Road and the northern entrance of Turtle Rock Boulevard. This pipeline will provide increased pressure and flow in the reuse system for irrigation within the Palmer Ranch community. Conversely, during periods of wet weather, the pipeline will allow additional reclaimed water to be disposed of down a deep injection well, located at one of the County's regional water reclamation facilities.

Since construction will be within the County right-of-way, there will not likely be any impacts to residential properties. However, pipeline connections at two intersections; Palmer Ranch Parkway extension and McIntosh Road and Palmer Ranch Parkway and Turtle Rock Boulevard (north entrance) will cause temporary disruption to vehicular and pedestrian traffic.



Construction is anticipated to begin in late 2019 With completion in early 2020.

According to FPL..

Do you set your thermostat fan to auto or always on? Is there a difference in the price you pay to cool/heat your home?

You bet there is! "AUTO" means the fan turns on automatically down the heating and cooling cycles. Once the desired temp is reached the system, including the fan shuts down.

When the fan is set to "ON" it remains on constantly, meaning the fan will run approximately 200 extra hours an month.

A typical size central air conditioner would cost you about

\$8.00 more a month, or about \$100 a year.

Also keep in mind that a fan that runs all the time will wear out sooner and need to be replaced. Setting your fan to AUTO also provides better dehumidification.
