

Architectural Review Committee (ARC)



The ARC experienced a relatively heavy workload over the holidays as we had 14 new applications for exterior improvements to homes and landscapes and 12 final applications to approve. This was a particularly challenging month as a relatively large number of homeowners asked for an expedited approval of projects – some of which had already begun.

ARC members are happy to expedite projects that are true emergencies such as leaking roofs, but are less pleased when we are asked to approve a project either because the homeowner has scheduled the contractor to begin in a day or two, or the roof tiles (without ARC approval) are being delivered and installed. This is a reminder that no work should begin without ARC approval.

It is also important that ARC applications be complete. For example, if there is an exterior house painting, the ARC needs to see the paint colors painted on the house. This includes the color of the main house as well as the trim and doors. Copies of color samples are unacceptable, as are paint sample chips. There is no substitute for seeing the actual color samples on the house. This is a requirement.

As you know, the ARC members are volunteers and we have set times for when applications are due, for visiting homes, and for monthly meetings. The ARC schedule is posted on the Community Center bulletin board. This past month ARC members spent an inordinate amount of time revisiting homes which had submitted incomplete applications or requested an expedited approval for non-emergency work. Some visits involved weekends and evenings.

The ARC applauds the community for wanting to renovate, repair, and beautify their homes and landscapes. We always stand by to assist homeowners as they contemplate new projects. But we ask that homeowners follow the rules on the ARC application form and the Turtle Rock Owners' Manual so that we can best serve the community as a whole.

Turtle Rock Retention Pond Task Force

The Turtle Rock Retention Pond Task Force recently submitted its findings and recommendations to the Board of Governors. The Task Force, formed last spring to study the issue of shoreline erosion, its impact to our ponds, and to recommend a course of action, learned there were additional challenges facing our community ponds. These included the presence of chemicals, lawn clippings, fertilizers/ other nutrients, pet waste, invasive tilapia, plus the need for improved maintenance of drainage structures to promote healthy water flow. Our Task Force had minimal knowledge at the outset of this project and we realized educating homeowners and residents on best practices for pond and wetland management is essential.

To get educated, the Task Force met with a number of experts from Sarasota County, University of Florida, Sarasota Bay Estuary, Palmer Ranch Natural Assets Committee, and Turtle Rock's contractors who currently perform certain services for our ponds and preserves: Stantec and Aquagenix. Plus our members made site visits to neighboring Palmer Ranch communities who already have a program in place to improve their ponds and wetlands management.

These experts, many of whom inspected samples of our community's 31 ponds, uniformly recommended the course of action described in the final report.

It includes:

Establishing a minimum three-foot wide, 12-inch tall grass or vegetative buffer on property immediately surrounding the ponds.

Installing an aquatic plant buffer established in the shallow waters in ponds where there is currently little or no aquatic vegetation.

Creating a 6-inch channel or trough separating the two buffers to ensure the effectiveness of each.

Retention Pond Task Force cont'd...

This combination of buffer zones has been shown to be effective in retarding shoreline erosion. It has also been shown to improve the habitat for wildlife and birds and water quality and filtration plus reduce the need for and impact of chemicals and other hazardous wastes.

The financial and ecological trajectory of not taking a proactive approach to preserve our ponds and wetlands can be extremely costly in the future as shorelines continue to erode, pollutant levels become saturated and drainage structures and water flow become obstructed.

Fortunately, the cost to implement this plan is minimal, with the largest expenditure of \$25,000 going toward planting aquatic plants in ponds where they are needed.

The cost to maintain this plan is also considered minimal, roughly \$25,000 annually, for the HOA to engage contractors to periodically trim the property buffer zones all around our community, and to maintain or control aquatic plants, removing those that become invasive without the use of pesticides and herbicides.

Other recommended actions that will not incur costs, yet are needed to ensure a complete and successful ponds program include engaging contractors that remove invasive tilapia (which they keep and take to market), and enlisting our regional experts to help inform and educate our residents on our pond conditions and these initiatives to improve them and the shorelines.

The Task Force, which consisted of Becky Cox, Deirdre Cronin, Kathryn Harris, Doug Smith, Michelle van Shouwen, David Bryan as Board liaison, Ed Olson as property management resource, and myself, has been enthusiastically committed to this study from start to finish. We are equally enthusiastic about the feasibility, cost-effectiveness and benefits of the recommendations in the report, which can be read in its entirety on the Turtle Rock website. All residents are encouraged to read the report and help support these recommendations as yet another avenue for maintaining the appeal and desirability of the Turtle Rock community that our residents so richly enjoy.

Mailbox Task Force



The mailbox task force met again on January 9. At that meeting, a representative of our second vendor, ASAP Mailbox Installations and Repairs, showed samples of the mailboxes they would install. They are manufactured by the same company that Forsite proposed to use. The mailboxes are on "display" inside the Community Center for you to look at. The black box would be used in all of Turtle Rock and the white double box post used in Savannah.

The option of including a flag pole holder on the post was discussed and it was decided that this would be the choice of the homeowner and at their expense. Also the possibility of enlarging the house number plaque under the box was suggested. The task force also discussed how to proceed with the removal of the existing boxes and installing the new boxes, and any legal implications that might arise. We will consult our attorney for an opinion. Once all the details are worked out, we will present our findings and recommendations to the Board of Governors.

Life is better with bees! The Sarasota Honey Company

Alma Johnson's passions are many. She loves working with young adults with special needs. She loves growing and eating produce from her own gardens. She loves spreading the word about the valuable products of bees. She has combined all of these passions into the

Sarasota Honey Company which has 600 hives and counting in urban areas in Manasota and Sarasota counties.

Her bees come from capturing unwanted bees and breeding bees. You might remember from biology class that there are three types of bees in a hive. The Queen bee is the center of the hive. Her job is to produce the next Queen bee. The worker bees are only female. They have stingers and 3 million hairs on their legs and bodies which collect pollen from flowers. They also collect water. Drones are males and have no stinger. They depend on females to feed them. Their only job is to mate. Once the air temperature is a 65 degrees, females herd the males to one spot and decapitate them and kick them out of the hive.

Prior to WWII farms had mixed crops and did not use chemicals, but afterward motor driven machinery made it possible to farm larger tracts of land. Farms became a monoculture which is a food desert to bees. This led to a deep decline in bee populations. There are now companies that transport bees on flatbeds to farms to pollenate the crop. California's largest monoculture crop is almonds. This migratory bee service helps the farmers, but it also can spread disease as it moves from place to place. More chemicals on crops have also contributed to the decline in the number of bees.

Alma encourages everyone to help bees by planting wildflowers. She sells seeds at her store. Provide a water dish with rocks that bees can land on. Support your local beekeeper.

Sarasota Honey Company's honey is raw honey. It contains a spectrum of vitamins, 22 amino acids and 27 minerals. When honey is collected, bees are brushed off the frames and the honey is cut off using cold blades to prevent burns to her staff. The honey goes through a hand cranked spinner, again for safety, and is then bottled and labeled. The company store is located at 2227 University Parkway. It features soaps, candles, bee-themed towels, stickers, jewelry and clothing as well as many honey varieties such as Manasota and Sarasota Blend Raw Wildflower and Blueberry Orange Blossom. On Saturday morning Alma gives tours of her store garden and hives. Check the calendar on the website for dates and times: **sarasotahoneycompany.com**.



8801 Stoneybrook Blvd., Sarasota, FL 34238.






Turtle Rock Women's Club

Trip Tips, if you travel to ...

Karen Howe -Three weeks in France

Fred and I worked with a travel consultant to arrange an early fall trip to France. We started out in Champagne, where we stayed in a chateau hotel with a three-star Michelin restaurant—the hotel and the restaurant are owned by the chef. We hired a private tour company to take us to some of the wineries, and we also visited others on our own.

Tip: We used Frommer's and Rick Steves guides to plan our trip. Both were extremely helpful, but we especially liked Rick Steves, who is less formal and had tips on the type of out-of-the-way places we love to explore. Following a tip from a friend, removed the pages dealing with the places we were visiting and packed just those instead of the two books.

From Champagne, we went to Paris. Our hotel was the Edouard

VII on Ave. de l'Opera, centrally located and lovely. We celebrated our anniversary with dinner at the Jules Verne Restaurant in the Eiffel Tower. Another evening we took the dinner cruise on the Seine. How beautiful Paris is at night!

A favorite memory is visiting Giverny and seeing Monet's gardens—and then going to the Musee de L'Orangerie (in Paris) and viewing the two circular rooms paneled with Monet's water lilies paintings.

We took the TGV (high speed) train from Paris to Bordeaux, and stayed at the Intercontinental, with its two-star Michelin restaurant. (We ate very well on this trip!) We joined a small group tour and visited vineyards in St. Emilion and Medoc, of course, sampling wine everywhere we went. From there, we rented a car and drove to the Dordogne region, where we stayed for four days—our favorite part of the trip.

Trip Tips contd...

Some of our favorite memories from Dordogne include:

The village of Oradour-sur Glane, now a permanent memorial and museum dedicated to the 642 inhabitants, including women and children, who were massacred there during WWII

A truffle farm, where we learned about the harvesting of truffles

A goose farm

Font de Gaume: A cave with prehistoric drawings

Food, food; fabulous local restaurants, some of them Michelin-starred, but without the hoopla of bigger city Michelin-starred restaurants; every single restaurant, a celebration of local, delicious food

Tip: The caves with prehistoric drawings are closing to tourists. We were able to see one of the last ones that is still open. Local tour guides are able to get a number of tickets in advance, but they are often booked a year ahead; the remaining tickets are for visitors who must line up hours before the caves open and hope to be able to get a ticket. It seems likely that this cave will close, too, and visitors will only be able to see the drawings as they are replicated in museums.

Leaving lovely Dordogne, we drove to Avignon, a historic walled city where we stayed three nights. There we toured the Palais du Papes and the Saint- Benezet Bridge made famous in a children's song: "Sur le Pont d'Avignon". Besides sightseeing (we were able to walk everywhere we wanted to go), we had a cooking class. We made fish soup :several whole fish cooked in a highly seasoned broth and then put through a food mill...served with a small boney fish in the center of the soup bowl. It was interesting, but not one of our favorite meals!



Tip: Don't use Uber in historic cities in France. Uber doesn't have the same rights as taxi drivers. For example, in Avignon, our Uber driver had to drop us off outside the walls, and pointed us to a narrow cobblestoned road up a hill that took us, dragging our suitcases, to our hotel. The taxis, we learned later, have remote controls to lower the barriers that restrict traffic and could have dropped us off at the hotel entrance.

From Avignon, we went to Marseilles, staying in the multi-cultural port city one night before heading back home to Sarasota. We loved everything, but particularly recommend Dordogne.
