Again the only business to be transacted will be essential HOA business. Please keep abreast of the COVID-19 conditions by following the CDC and Florida Department of Health websites.

I walk the neighborhood multiple times per week and I would like to thank and commend our residents for following the CDC guideline for social distancing. Based on all of the data from the various authorities this seems to be working in stemming the transmission of the virus.

### **April Board of Governors Meeting.**

Since the Board of Governors meetings will only address essential services during the State of Emergency, the actions at the April meeting were very limited. The only action taken was to approve the charter for the new Pond Committee. Please go to the Turtle Rock website, under Community Association, to read the charter.

The Board of Governors recognizes Turtle Rock residents may be stressed by the current situation, so until we exit these State of Emergency the Board of Governors does not intend to change any operations other than to comply with Federal, State and local authorities' directives. 

# **Manager's Message**



May is here, and at the time of this writing, there is a light at the end of the tunnel. I hope everyone is doing well and of course staying safe. These are trying times for everyone, so please be patient, thoughtful and kind. Management is providing all of the services needed without the walk-in traffic. Please call me any time.

With the Community Center, pool, tennis courts, basketball courts and exercise equipment all closed, we ask that everyone adheres to this and hopefully they will be opening soon.

The first virtual Board of Governors' meeting went well with about 30 people attending by conference call. As of this writing, May's meeting will be held the same way. It is my hope that more people will take this opportunity to get involved.

There has been some talk about trying to amend the Turtle Rock documents to allow pickup trucks to be parked in the driveway. Until this happens, no trucks are allowed to be parked on the driveway at any time and is a violation of the Turtle Rock Owners' Manual. As I drive around the community it seems like a growing number of homeowners have forgotten this rule. If there is an extenuating circumstance, please contact my office and we will discuss options.

# These excerpts are right out of the Turtle Rock Owners' Manual. Trucks:

Any vehicle that was designed with an open cargo bed (whether covered or not); Any vehicle that was manufactured as a chassis designed for a payload capacity of one ton or more regardless of the style of box or body attached to the chassis; Any vehicle registered as a truck with the Department of Motor Vehicles.

### Vehicle Parking, repairs, and storage:

No trucks, commercial vans, unlicensed vehicles, boats, campers, trailers, mobile homes, motor homes, or other such vehicles may be parked at any time upon any portion of a lot unless parked within a garage and totally out of view. This restriction does not prohibit the temporary parking of commercial vehicles making deliveries, or while used in connection with providing services to any residence.

### **NEW COLORS ON NICE WAY**

The Somerset at Turtle Rock homeowner's association has started to paint the exteriors of all 66 homes on Nice Way, a project that is expected to continue for the next several months. Somerset places a portion of the homeowners' quarterly fees in reserve to fund the painting project, which occurs every eight to ten years.

The Somerset association, in partnership with the Turtle Rock Architectural Review Committee, has offered residents an expanded color palette to choose from by adding approximately a dozen new colors for the first time. This provides homeowners the choice of staying with more "traditional" colors, or exploring "today's" colors. Traditional or today, the colors have been selected for their ability to harmoniously blend within the neighborhood.

Many of us are walking or bicycling more within the community during these times of "safer at home" orders. Please feel free to add Nice Way to your route to watch the progress of the painting. Please note, however, as a "No Thru Street", cars are discouraged.

### Architectural Review Committee (ARC)



For those of you who do not know, the Turtle Rock Architectural Review Committee (ARC) is composed of five volunteer residents who review owners' requests for making exterior improvements to our properties. The Committee is composed of your neighbors Becky Cox, Jim Vaughan, Margaret Borrows, Chuck Barackman, and Curt Gilroy. The Committee seeks to ensure that changes will be consistent with Turtle Rock's standards and promote an overall harmonious appearance within our community.

In the first quarter of 2020, the ARC approved a total of 81 requests by means of visiting each property. Are you curious about what improvements your neighbors are making? Here is a summary of the most popular ones:

New Doors and/or Windows – (14 requests). In addition to windows, this category includes garage doors and lanai sliders. In every instance, homeowners have elected to upgrade to hurricane-resistant materials, which also provide increased sound insulation.

New Paint – (14 requests). New paint is well-recognized as the quickest way to improve a home's appearance. New paint not only restores weathered surfaces, but offers an opportunity to update to "today's" colors. Furthermore, the ARC also coordinated with the Somerset Association to approve the repainting of all 66 homes on Nice Way including a variety of new colors – for a total of 80 homes.

Tree Removal/Replacement – (10 requests). Turtle Rock is blessed with an abundance of mature trees and shrubbery, not only in our preserves but on our individual properties. Unfortunately, trees can sometimes cause problems when planted too close to homes or driveways. And a few, such as Brazilian Peppers, are invasive and should be removed. The ARC can recommend replacement trees that are more suitable for restricted size areas, such as Crepe Myrtle and Ligustrum, as well as Black Olive for larger areas.

But there are many varieties from which to choose.

New Roofs – (8 requests). As our community matures, replacement roofs will become more common. Roofs may be the most expensive maintenance issue a Florida homeowner (with a tile roof) will undertake. Hopefully, recent improvements in roof underlayment will extend their service life.

Pavers – (6 requests). The variegated colors and textures of paver driveways and walkways are a welcome change from the typical bland concrete. Care must be taken in selecting pavers that blend harmoniously with a home's roof and paint. Pavers actually add significant value to the home.

Landscape Refresh – (6 requests). Mature landscape beds can easily be refreshed with the addition of new, more colorful plantings to replace the older ones.

Painted Lanai Cage – (5 requests). The "trendiest" request the ARC has noticed recently is the repainting of white lanai cages with a deep bronze. The deep bronze (almost black) color makes lanai cages much less visible when viewing ponds, preserves, or other backgrounds.

The ARC is encouraged that so many Turtle Rock homeowners are making individual investments that contribute to the overall enhancement of our community and to their own property values. Recent events may delay improvements, but where there is a will, there is a way. Stay healthy everyone.

### **Mailbox Task Force**

As everyone is aware, the Mailbox Task Force has been unable to meet because of the restrictions we are all living under today. We have not forgotten about this important project and we hope you haven't either.



As I have been riding my bike and walking the neighborhoods of Turtle Rock, I take particular notice of the mailboxes that line our beautiful streets. Many of them are in sad shape. Take a look and see if you don't agree. This is because management has suspended the compliance notifications to homeowners, telling homeowners of our plan to replace all of the mailboxes this year. Now that it looks like this will not happen this year, many posts have deteriorated and are badly in need of attention. I would estimate that 75% of the posts and/or boxes should be replaced. As the association rules exist today, the cost to the homeowner to comply with regulations is around \$295. The Task Force suggests that owners should inexpensively repair and/or paint dilapidated posts in anticipation of the eventual replacement with the metal variety. Please, if nothing else, check your box and post to see if it might benefit from a simple cleaning and/or painting.

Remember, the proposal of the Task Force was to update the Association's restrictive covenants to transfer ownership of the mailboxes to the Homeowners' Association, which will then assume all maintenance. Such an endeavor will require a YES vote from no less than 506 Turtle Rock homeowners, so we will need your help to adopt this modification.





long life and superior UV durability. The top and base (solid cover) of the post matches the street signs and is very attractive. The post will be surrounded by a concrete donut to protect it from landscaping equipment. The mailbox itself is rust free cast aluminum with a gold flag. The easy to read house number plaque has gold numbers and hangs off the post below the mailbox.

Again, the Task Force would like to point out the advantages to the homeowners in having attractive, uniform, low maintenance mailboxes:

\*There will be no more compliance regulations for your mailbox (which will be owned by Turtle Rock)

\*It will greatly improve the appearance of our community, and therefore increase your home value.



# Palmer Ranch Natural Assets Committee Report

### Q: What happens to the water in our ponds?

A: Most of it flows into Little Sarasota Bay and, eventually, the Gulf of Mexico.

All of Palmer Ranch's lakes and ponds are a part of a connected, man-made stormwater management system that is designed to help prevent flooding and maintain the Bay's water quality.



Most of it evaporates—about 74%.

The remainder flows into the Bay. Almost 35% of the water in the Bay is from direct runoff.

Our stormwater runoff flows into two creeks: Catfish Creek, which enters Little Sarasota Bay near Vamo, and South Creek, which flows through Oscar Scherer State Park and empties into the Bay south of Blackburn Bridge. We're part of the Little Sarasota Bay watershed—one of seven watersheds in Sarasota County.

A few facts about our watershed:

It's 44 square miles, with 36 named lakes and ponds and eight named creeks and canals feeding into Little Sarasota Bay.

It's home to oysters, manatees, sea turtles, dolphins, many species of fish, waterfowl, hawks, bald eagles, osprey, and much more.

It has a healthy population of sea grass—nurseries of the ocean that support fish and shellfish and serve as food for manatees and sea turtles.

Its creeks contain too little dissolved oxygen and too much nitrogen and phosphorous.

Catfish Creek carries the largest amount of water in our watershed, and almost half the pollution load.

The two creeks our stormwater ponds drain into—Catfish Creek and South Creek—do not currently meet Florida water quality standards.

From fertilizing to applying pesticides to picking up pet waste (or not), many things we do every day affect our watershed. # Trip Tips, if you travel to ...

With travel suspended, you may think about future trips, new places to explore or favorite places to re-visit. One of my favorite cities is Nice, France. There's so much to see and do there, it's incredibly beautiful, and there are fabulous day trips along the coast and up into the mountain villages

I refer you to the vast number of excellent tour guides for details about the tourist sites; what I most want to share with you are the sites I re-visit time after time and places I discovered—often by happenstance. To the best of my knowledge (and by verifying with Google), they all continue to exist. I learned to check on this after my last visit to Paris, when I was dismayed to find some of my haunts had disappeared. I had to remind myself I had been going to these places—at least smiling as I walked past them—for more than 50 years, so it should not be such a surprise that some closed!

### Nice, France:

Hotel: It's pricey, but unforgettable and marvelous: the Negresco, on the Bay of Angels. Even if you don't stay there, stop by and visit: see the huge Baccarat crystal chandelier and the Picasso paintings in the foyer; have breakfast, lunch or dinner at the Carousel Restaurant on the corner of the hotel—with it's merry -go-round décor. ### What to see and do:

\*The Old city (Vieux Nice) – walk all around!

\*Cours Salaya: flower market, flea market, restaurants (on the edge of the Old City)

\*Take the little train, you'll see it alongside the beach across the street from the Negresco Hotel; it takes you up into the hills for a beautiful view of the city and coastline

# Trip Tips contd...

\*Visit Moulin Alziari, 318 Boulevard de la Madelaine, Monday-Friday, 9 a.m.-12:30 p.m., 1-5 p.m., no charge, demonstrations of olive oil made using an ancient stone press; tastings of what is considered by gourmets as one of the best olive oils in the world. Note: Years ago, I visited the original mill, which has since moved into new quarters, where you would visit. At that time, when we arrived at the door, the first thing we saw was a huge mound of olive pits, which the olive oil maker used as fuel; he toasted bread for us (over the olive pit fire), and brushed the bread with freshly pressed Alziari olive oil, made from a centuries-old grinding stone. He had the softest hands—he said his wife loved them—from handling olive oil all day every day. One of my favorite memories.

### **Shops:**

\*Alziari, 14 rue St. Francois de Paule, for the best olive, olive wood souvenirs, barrels of olives (get some to munch on); in the shops next door, all kinds of great tablecloths and other table linens with Provence themed fabric. Tip: bring home a can of the olive oil; the can itself is so artistic, I followed the example of locals and, when I'd finished the olive oil, I removed the top of the can and used the can as a flower vase.

\*Henri Auer, 7 rue St. Francois de Paule, great gift shop for south of France candy and chocolate

\*Aux Parfums de Grasse, 10 rue Ste. Gaetan, for very small bottles of perfume, all flower essences (great souvenirs) – this "shop" is usually a table set up outside at this address in the Old City

### Food:

- \*Lou Pistou, 4 rue Raoul Bosio
- \*La Pizza cresci, 34 rue Massena ,pedestrian mall, has excellent eggplant parm, as well as pizzas.
- \*La Petite Maison, more high end restaurant, very well known, great reputation; likely to need a reservation; 11 rue Ste. François de Paule
- \*You can't go wrong with getting a sandwich from one of the stands: the French bread with cheese, ham, whatever—so good!

\*\*\*\*\*Don't miss: Fenocchio's in Place Rossetti, Old Nice (Vieux Nice) for the best gelato in Nice—and some say, the world!

# FENOCCHIO Maitre Glacier

### Day trips:

\*Cannes: take a bus from the airport, or the train

\*Monte Carlo: Rent a car, or ask the hotel to arrange for a driver, or see if the hotel has a tour (consider going to a spa there, in addition to seeing the casinos, shops, and changing of the guard).

\*On the way to Monte Carlo, stop at Eze and visit the Fragonard perfume factory,



for some exclusive lovely floral scents (available in small hand-luggage size containers; see photo, display is next to coffee cup, to show size)

\*Rent a car or hire a driver for a truly memorable day in the maritime Alps. Visit beautiful St. Paul de Vence and dine at the famous La Colombe d'Or; it was much-loved by Picasso and Matisse, among other artists, many of whom
