The Turtle Rock Board hopes everyone had a good Thanksgiving and wishes you a happy holiday season.



Landscape and Grounds Committee



Landscape and Grounds Committee update for November 2020

The Committee, along with Ed Olson, met with Shane Battle from Bloomings at the community center on November 17.

Several ongoing projects were reviewed with Shane. He confirmed that before the end of this calendar year Bloomings would replace the dying Duranta at the south entrance and in the median just south of the community center, remove the declining hedge along the backside of the tennis courts and replace it with dwarf Podocarpus, replace the damaged street corner turf along Turtle Rock Blvd, and relandscape both the west and east corners of south Sabal Lake Circle and Turtle Rock Blvd. Top dressing of the mulch along Turtle Rock Blvd will also be done. Shane also agreed to clean up the debris around the south gate and to give the area a trim to create a uniform look. Bloomings is currently in the process of applying fertilization and pest control, along with seeding barren areas along the Blvd.

Bloomings was reminded to leave a two foot un-mowed strip around all ponds in common areas. Some Committee members will be taking a monthly walk with Shane down Turtle Rock Blvd to determine what, if anything, needs to be done. The first date was set for December 10th. Ed Olson reported that he hasn't received a date yet from the tree trimmer to have the oak trees trimmed along the Blvd. He will keep the Committee posted.

The Committee will be recommending to the Board of Governors to approve the funding for the purchase and installation of three 6 foot park benches in Turtle Rock. One bench would be located immediately south of the community center overlooking the pond, one would be located between the pool house and the community center, and one would be located adjacent to the butterfly garden.

The Committee is also busy getting the upcoming holiday decorations ready. Members of the Committee will be getting together on November 24 to work on the holiday wreaths, garland and bows.

Architectural Review Committee (ARC)



The ARC experienced another busy period this past month with over 30 applications from residents for home and property improvements. New roofs and exterior painting continue to dominate home renovations as our properties age. However, we have noticed an increase in applications for tree removals, particularly for trees that were planted in an inappropriate place by the developers or simply trees that have grown too large – particularly oaks. A number of residents are so sorry to have to remove some of these large trees. Since in most cases trees need to be replaced in order to meet the minimum number as specified in the Turtle Rock Owners' Manual, we are often asked about appropriate replacements that will provide the shade, stature, and beauty of the oaks.

The recommendation is an easy one. Plant a Shady Lady (or Black Olive) tree. It has become the “go-to” substitute for oaks and other trees. They are attractive in so many ways (although there no olives for your martini!). They are hardy, do not have roots that spread and become obtrusive, and have lush layers of leaves in attractive zig-zag patterns that some say mimic a bonsai look. As a result, Shady Ladies are one of the most beautiful and popular shade trees in southern Florida.



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Architectural Review Committee (ARC) Cont'd




Developers are planting them in place of oaks, and you can see them in rows along Honore Avenue heading south from Central Sarasota Parkway. Bloomings, Turtle Rock's landscape company, is planting them in our common areas. But there are also some wonderful examples on private property within Turtle Rock.

These trees mature in a beautiful, well-shaped rounded acquiesce crown, having much smaller leaves than an oak. They are also not a messy tree, as their leaves are very small and do not leave "leaf litter." Because they are not huge trees, they would work very well in our Turtle Rock landscapes. They are moderate growers and can reach about 30 feet at maturity providing amazing shade and a delightfully layered look. Shady Ladies like sun, are salt tolerant, and are basically evergreen – maintaining dark green leaves nearly all year.

They should be planted 15 feet from the house, but roots are really not a problem so the tree can be planted as close as 6 feet from a driveway, although you will have to trim lower branches as the tree matures to allow for foot or vehicle traffic. They are also great "snowbird" trees as they require very little care.

Remember that trees are a wonderful natural asset. Not only are they beautiful, create habitat for wildlife, and provide shade and coolness from our hot Florida sun, but they benefit the environment by helping to keep it free from toxins, supplying life on earth with nutrients and combatting the negative effects of harmful gasses that exist in it.

Birding Notes



It's that time of year again. Wood Storks are visiting the ponds of Turtle Rock. You can't miss these large (40 inch length, 5.5 lbs.) birds. They are mostly white with a bumpy, unfeathered black neck that climbs up to a smooth forehead and ends in a large de-curved bill. They forage in 6 to 12 inches of water around the edges of our ponds looking for small fish, invertebrates, amphibians and reptiles. Sometimes they spread one wing out to shade the water or dangle their toes just in the water to stir up food.



Wood Storks are social birds that nest in colonies in swamps or mangroves near standing water and good sources of food. Most seasons storks lay 2 to 5 eggs which take about 30 days to hatch. After 10 to 12 weeks, they are ready to fly. Juvenile Storks have a yellowish bill and dull, grayish-brown feathered head and neck.

There isn't a colony in Turtle Rock, but a group of about 20 storks hang out in the trees across Philippi Creek from Pinecraft Park. Usually they don't nest there.




Wood Storks soar much of the day. They fly with head forward and legs extended straight back. The white wings are edged with black. Whenever you see birds soaring high in the air, you might find a Wood Stork in the group.

Mailbox Task Force Report



The **Mailbox Task Force** is excited to announce that the new mailboxes are coming to your front yard in early 2021! They are no longer on display inside the community center since the contractor is using them at a new job. The **white double box** will be installed in Savannah, and the **black single** one in rest of Turtle Rock.

They have been ordered, and **installation will begin in the first quarter of 2021**. As stated in last month's newsletter, the total cost of the mailboxes will be **fund-ed 100% by the Association**, thus avoiding any special assessment to the homeowners! They will be the only acceptable mailboxes going forward.

In preparation for the installation, it will be the **responsibility of homeowners to remove all landscaping and hardscaping surrounding their post.** You will be given ample lead time to do this. The new posts will be surrounded by a concrete donut, and new sod will be put down by the Association. No plantings will be allowed around the new posts; this will make maintenance easier and provide a uniform appearance.

"Protect our Ponds"

Turtle Rock Ponds Report

In coming weeks, Turtle Rock homeowners will start seeing new bursts of beauty and color along the littoral shelves (defined shallow areas close to shore) of several of our retention ponds. Turtle Rock, with the support of its Retention Pond Committee, is installing select aquatic plants in ponds 2, 4, 5, 7, 8, 26, and 31 (see Ponds map pages 16-17) with more ponds to come.

Spike rush, arrowhead and pickerelweed will help protect pond shorelines from erosion and will enhance the overall health and appearance of ponds. In the Butterfly Pond (Pond 7) yellow canna and fragrant water lily will further the mission of attracting butterflies. Aquatic plantings work in concert with the low maintenance zones (LMZs) that pond-side homeowners have been creating along their shores.

This is a measured approach to pond management that will also involve monitoring and removing invasive plants as needed.


A Holiday Tradition
