FLAG DAY – SUNDAY, JUNE 14TH

People across the United States celebrate Flag Day on **June 14** each year, to honor the United States flag and to commemorate the flag's adoption. On June 14, 1777, the Continental Congress replaced the British symbols of the Grand Union flag with a new design featuring 13 white stars in a circle on a field of blue and 13 red and white stripes – one for each state. The number of stars increased as the new states entered the Union. The flag of the United States represents freedom and has been an enduring symbol of the country's ideals since its early days. Many people in the United States honor this day

by displaying the American flag at homes and public buildings. We all remember the events of September 11, 2001. That evening, the American Flag first flew at the entries of Palmer Ranch and has been continuously displayed since.

Wildlife on Palmer Ranch

Native habitat preservation and wildlife corridors are an integral part of the planning process in development on the ranch. It's a regular occurrence to see a Bald Eagle soaring overhead, having to slow for a Sandhill Crane to cross the road, or witness a Roseate Spoonbill soar across a pond. One of the reasons many homeowners purchase homes on the ranch is due to the abundant wildlife. Members have witnessed Otters playing rambunctiously in our waterways. Further, nothing gets your attention quicker than hearing alligators practice their mating calls. Palmer Ranch also has Wild Turkey, Bobcat as well as the occasional Florida Panther sighting.

Sue's Grounds Corner

Because we've gotten several inquiries about Spatterdock (Lilly Pads) within Palmer Ranch waterways, Sue's Corner is dedicated to informing our members on the benefits of this aquatic plant. Spatterdock has a yellow "ball-shaped" flower and large heart-shaped leaves that often stick up above the surface of the water; they are not weeds.

Spatterdock provides shade within the water column. The shade prevents algae bloom which leads to decreased dissolved oxygen levels in the water and die-offs of fish and other species. You see, it's the sun penetrating the water that creates the algae. The sun heats up the water surface, which in turn spurs the growth of algae. Spatterdock shields the water from the heat of the sun, thus preventing the growth of algae and subsequently the use of chemicals to kill the algae. Besides being pleasing



to this writer's eye, Spatterdock does a great deal to maintain the well-being of the ponds they inhabit. Spatterdock is beneficial to our wildlife as it provides a stable surface and protection for successful fish spawning, protection for turtles, frogs, ducks and various species of birds, all of which are susceptible to predators such as alligators, water snakes, hawks and eagles. Please keep in mind that Spatterdock only blooms from April till December, when the water in our ponds and lakes is very hot from the constant sun. Mother Nature knows best how to protect our most essential resources.
